

White Oak is a state-of-the-art, scientific education and conservation center in Northern Florida focused on saving and recovering populations of rare species, building assurance populations, convening experts and training the next generation of conservation leaders.



White Oak is widely respected among conservationists for its work in protecting and propagating endangered animals, specifically **rhinoceros**, **elephants**, **cheetah**, **antelope**, and **okapi**. White Oak also works with state and federal agencies, including the US Fish and Wildlife Service, to recover and release into the wild some of Florida's native inhabitants, including **panthers** and **grasshopper sparrows**.



Conservation capacity building is fundamental to White Oak's core mission. Focused on immersive skill-based learning, White Oak's capacity building programs seek to empower all conservationists, from students to seasoned leaders. White Oak conducts diverse training, capacity building and education programs, to advance the potential and ignite the passion of future conservation leaders.

White Oak, a privately managed AZA accredited facility and a key member of the expansive TWF Conservation family, plays a crucial role in a global initiative that encompasses over 1 million acres. TWF Conservation safeguards thousands of animals, including rhinos, elephants, primates, and okapi. Its efforts involve creating assurance populations, protecting rare species in their environments (including one-third of the world's remaining black rhinos), restoring ecosystems, and preserving wilderness areas in North America and Africa.

- At least 8 years in a leadership role in zoo/wildlife veterinary medicine.
- An advanced degree in a field related to wildlife ecology, conservation, or epidemiology is highly desirable.
- Eligibility for, and prompt attainment of, veterinary licensure in Florida.
- ☐ USDA/APHIS accreditation in Florida.
- Experience with elephants as well as comfort working in range countries is desirable.
- ☐ Ability to obtain and maintain a valid federal DEA license (Schedule II through V)
- ☐ Leadership role(s), or strong involvement, with a regional or international conservation program is desirable.
- Proven track record in scientific investigation with peer reviewed publications in wildlife and/or conservation medicine and science is desirable.
- ☐ Comprehensive knowledge of established principles and best practices of zoo and wildlife animal medicine, including safety, animal restraint, dangerous drug administration, record keeping and observation skills.
